

Three times more children are now receiving psychological support

In 2024, the number of children participating in psychological recovery programs tripled compared to 2022. A total of 11,937 individual counseling sessions and 257 group sessions were conducted, while 228 beneficiaries took part in art therapy activities.



Every happy story of our children

From Zakhar, who became a mentor at an IT camp after losing his father, to Polina, who learned to stand with the help of special equipment — every child is a reason for our shared pride and gratitude.



Devices have already helped 1,836 children continue their education

In 2024, a total of 1,836 laptops, tablets, or smartphones were distributed. 100% of the children reported that learning became easier and more engaging



Over \$8 million provided in support for children

In 2024, thanks to the support of donors, the Foundation raised \$8,104,709 to support children.



1,385 first aid kits and 6,340 vitamin packs distributed

The Foundation delivered these to children in 2024.



Over the past two years, the number of camps has tripled

In 2022, 68 children attended camps. By 2024, the number grew to 1,973 children and 286 guardians. These camps offer more than rest — they bring back a sense of real childhood.



418 children received private health insurance (PHI)

Rehabilitation, treatment, check-ups, and ongoing support for the most vulnerable and severely affected children.



99% of families are now connected through the chatbot

In 2024, a chatbot was launched as the main communication channel with families. Thanks to this tool, one family assistant can now support up to 300 families.



25 educational programs launched

Children studied with Ernst & Young, KSE, Lviv Polytechnic, Kyiv-Mohyla Academy, GolTeens, and others.



In 2024, assistants received 86 certificates upon completing their training


FAMILY ASSISTANTS PROGRAM AND CASE MANAGEMENT

The Family Assistants Program is a unique approach developed by the Children of Heroes Charity Fund to support every family under its care. Each family is assigned a dedicated assistant who accompanies them throughout their journey with the Fund. This role is especially vital, as most families initially find themselves overwhelmed and unsure of what their most urgent needs are — whether it's humanitarian aid, legal support, access to education, or psychological care. Through detailed assessments and open, compassionate conversations with the assistant, families are able to identify their top priorities, avoid receiving irrelevant or unnecessary aid, and ensure that


Case managers are specialists who support families in the most difficult situations — when basic assistance is no longer enough. They work closely with families who have lost their homes, require urgent medical treatment, or face other serious crises.

A case manager assesses each family's needs, develops a personalized action plan, and coordinates the support provided by the Fund. This is someone who doesn't just offer answers — they walk alongside the family, step by step, helping them resolve challenges. Their presence eases stress and restores a sense of stability and support.

Key Results



any signs of crisis are noticed and addressed in time.



On March 11, 2024, we launched a chatbot — and it became a true breakthrough in communication with families.

Automation significantly transformed our approach to work and helped us achieve new results. The number of families a single helper can support has nearly quadrupled — from 50 to 195. This was made possible by reducing manual tasks and optimizing processes.



THE IMPACT OF THE PROGRAM ON CHILDREN'S LIVES





On November 11, 2024, a missile destroyed our home in Kryvyi Rih. My daughter and I survived — we managed to move into the hallway after receiving the warning. Just minutes before the explosion, we had been in the children's room — which was completely wiped out. Later, among the rubble, we found pieces of the missile — the very ones that could have taken our lives.

We were left without an apartment, without our car — which held memories of my husband — and without the photos and gifts he had given our daughter. Thankfully, even our cat Tosha survived — my daughter lovingly calls him her little brother.


Now we're starting from scratch. Our entire life fits into one garage.

We're trying to rebuild some sense of normalcy and give our daughter back a feeling of home, hope, and care. It's not easy. But we're holding on. And I want her to always remember her father — his love and his strength.

Together, we will build a new life. He will always be with us in our hearts.



THE PROGRAM'S IMPACT ON CHILDREN'S LIVES









The Children of Heroes Charity Fund responded quickly: the family received financial support in the amount of 111,887 UAH. These funds made it possible to rent temporary housing and cover urgent needs — allowing the mother and daughter to recover, adapt to new circumstances, and begin their path to healing.

After the move, the daughter was able to return to her studies. The family's stress levels decreased. They are gradually rebuilding their daily life and receiving psychological support from the Fund's specialists. This is only the beginning — but it became possible thanks to timely support being there when it was needed most.

PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT PROGRAM

From day one, the Children of Heroes Charity Fund has prioritized psychological support as one of its core areas of work. We understand that unprocessed grief doesn't simply fade away — it transforms into anxiety, aggression, withdrawal, insomnia, or a loss of interest in life or learning. The program includes:

- individual sessions
- support groups
- art therapy

- psychoeducational lectures for families
- camps with integrated psychological support programs

Over the past year, we have seen a significant increase in requests for psychological support. These include anxiety disorders, sleep and concentration difficulties, emotional instability, challenges with adaptation, low motivation, and somatic symptoms. Some children are experiencing complicated grief, and others are at risk of developing PTSD.

The pilot study "Future Index" (2023) revealed that 44% of surveyed children and adolescents show signs of potential PTSD. According to data from the "How Are You?" program (2024–2025), the number of people in need of psychological support increased from 41% in 2022 to 71% in 2025.

The most vulnerable group remains children who have experienced loss — they account for 65% of all those seeking psychological help.

In 2025, we plan to expand our psychological support program so that even more children who have lost loved ones can begin their journey of healing in an environment of safety, care, and trust.








PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT PROGRAM


Questions raised by children and their guardians:

 Grief over a loss (both confirmed and uncertain)

 Anxiety, fears, phobias (mostly related to traumatic experiences)

- Low self-esteem and lack of motivation to study
- Psychosomatic symptoms (physical reactions caused by stress)
- Complicated grief and PTSD symptoms





· Challenges with social adjustment, including isolation and loss of friendships





Our focus is not only on helping children but also on supporting their guardians

As of December 31, 2024, a total of 28 specialists with psychotherapeutic education and experience working with individuals who have experienced trauma and loss were engaged in the program.

- Our therapists have an average of over 10 years of practical experience.
- All specialists are members of professional psychotherapeutic associations.



Over the year, we conducted 17 psychoeducational lectures and webinars for children and their guardians, and engaged 18 psychologists in 15 camp sessions providing psychological support.



A multimodal team (which includes a child psychiatrist) makes it possible to:

- promptly identify children and guardians in greatest need of support
- monitor changes in their emotional state
- conduct assessments and refer them to specialized programs or appropriate professionals


SOCIALIZATION PROGRAM

Camps are not just about rest and recreation.

For many children, they are a return to childhood. Camps offer a space where they can make new friends, learn, receive psychological support, stay active, play, and most importantly — feel safe. For those who have experienced loss, this is vital. In these moments, they begin to rediscover joy, regain self-confidence, and believe in the future again.

Every child supported by the Foundation has the opportunity to attend a camp and create lasting, joyful memories.

Each camp is selected based on specific criteria — the child's age, level of activity, and whether they require psychological support. This ensures that every child receives the experience and care best suited to their individual needs.



In 2024, we launched a new initiative that allowed children to attend camps together with their caregivers. This was part of a new program called "Svitlyachok" ("Little Firefly"). Thanks to this program, even the youngest children — from 1 to 6 years old — were able to experience camp for the first time, accompanied by their mothers. For these camps, we adapted the program: mothers attended sessions with psychologists, while children enjoyed art therapy, play, and rest in a safe, calm environment.

In 2024, the Children of Heroes CF organized camp experiences for 1,973 children and 286 caregivers — a significant increase compared to previous years: 68 children attended in 2022, and 1,207 in 2023.

In 2023, we organized 59 camps, and in 2024 — already 99.



SOCIALIZATION PROGRAM RESULTS

In 2024, camps offering psychological support programs were the most in demand. They were attended by 1,191 participants out of a total of 2,259.

Educational camps also saw active growth, especially among teenagers who were already thinking about their future careers and preparing for university entrance.

For the first time, two children with disabilities took part in an inclusive camp.

This was just the beginning, and we plan to expand this area further.



A total of 178 people were able to travel abroad.

Among them were 10 teenagers who successfully passed an English language test and went to the Tomorrow educational camp in the UK. There, they had a tour of Durham University and met with the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Ukraine to the United Kingdom, Valerii Zaluzhnyi.

One of the key achievements of 2024 was the expansion of our partner network. Twenty new camp organizers joined our cooperation.

This allowed us to offer more opportunities for children, select programs with better quality and cost, create joint projects, and make recreation and development even more effective.



HOW THE EDUCATIONAL CAMP HELPED VALIA FIND HER FUTURE PROFESSION



Valia, beneficiary of the Children of Heroes Charity Fund

My name is Valia, I'm 14 years old. I've always been a good student and took part in academic competitions. My favorite subjects are Ukrainian language and literature. I also study at the Ostroh School of Arts and will graduate from the vocal class next year.

I've been interested in journalism for quite a while, but it was after attending the Ukraine Today educational camp that I started seriously considering it as my future profession. The atmosphere at the camp was amazing — engaging lectures (especially those by Viktoriia Mazur and other journalists), support from the team, and great conversations with other teens. We had so much in common, and we're still keeping in touch.

There wasn't much time to rest — the week was intense and full of new experiences. But that's what made it exciting. The camp leaders were incredible — they really connected with us, which made everything feel warm and welcoming, like home. What I remember most are the mime workshops, team challenges, and evening activities. They helped me open up and better understand myself.

This camp was truly important to me. I left with new knowledge, new friends, inspiration — and a clear sense of who I want to become.

We believe that our children are the future professional capital of Ukraine — future doctors, scientists, educators, artists, and entrepreneurs. That's why educational support is one of our core programs. Our goal is to ensure that every child has access to the knowledge and resources that open doors to the best universities in Ukraine and around the world.

The program includes several key areas designed to help children learn with confidence, curiosity, and meaningful results.

When shaping the Foundation's program portfolio, we prioritize the real needs of families. Twice a year, we conduct surveys among the families who benefit from our programs. This allows us to receive direct feedback and clearly understand which initiatives are most valuable and where gaps still exist that we can address.

We prioritize programs with long-term impact. Our aim is not just to provide one-time assistance, but to invest in the future.

We believe that the support offered today should create a broad and lasting positive effect on each child's life. That's why we focus on initiatives that build skills, offer educational and self-development opportunities, and contribute to the longterm stability and well-being of families.





EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Tutoring Support

Children receive one-on-one support in mathematics and Ukrainian language. This help allows them to catch up on school subjects, close learning gaps, and regain confidence in themselves.

University Entrance Preparation

We help children prepare for the multi-subject test, explore which professions suit them best, and confidently navigate every stage of the university admission process.

Foreign Languages

The focus is on English, but other languages are offered as well. Language skills mean freedom — to travel, study abroad, make new friends, and access more opportunities.

IT and Programming

Some start with basic courses, others dive straight into coding. The key is to explore a new field, discover whether it's the right fit, and gain skills that are already in high demand worldwide.

Creativity

Drawing, music, theater everything that helps children express themselves, find balance, and simply be who they are. We support them on this journey.

Learning Devices

We provide children with laptops, tablets, or smartphones so they can learn online without barriers, complete homework, and take courses.



Stationery Supplies

Even the small things — pens, notebooks, markers — matter. We've made sure children have everything they need at their fingertips.



EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

In 2024, with the support of partners and their individual engagement, the Foundation implemented a number of strategically important educational initiatives. These programs helped children grow, explore future careers, and prepare for university admission.

DEVICES / DIGITAL EQUIPMENT

The future is being shaped right now—through access to knowledge and the skills a child can develop.

That's why one of our top priorities is to provide children with the essential tools to begin their journey. Because there's no point in talking about education if they can't even access Zoom. And it's hard to talk about dreams when the basics for learning aren't in place.

This is how our digital access program was born. Simple in form, but essential in purpose. What follows is a look at the devices that became more than just tools—they became real keys to the world for our children.

Why does it matter?

Many of the children we support live in frontline areas or rely entirely on online learning.

Without a device, a child can't attend online classes, submit assignments, or communicate with teachers.

In 2022, 2023, and 2024, the Devices for education Fund provided 3,625 devices to children:

• 254 — in 2022

• 1535 — in 2023,

• 1836 — in 2024.

Protection from information isolation.

In places where schools are inaccessible offline, a device becomes the only gateway to the world of knowledge and opportunity.

Without it, a child risks falling into an educational void.

A chance for self-realization.

For younger children, it means access to interactive learning.

For teenagers, it's the opportunity to explore IT, design, programming laying the foundation for a future career.





Over the course of the year, we delivered 35,884 humanitarian aid packages, with a total weight of 208,127 tons.

For a child to grow up feeling safe and stable, three basic needs must be met: warmth, food, and hygiene. That's why we provide consistent household-level support to families:

- food packages
- hygiene supplies
- diapers for children under 3 years old
- baby formula and food
- clothing and shoes
- heating and lighting supplies (heaters, generators, firewood, etc.)

This support helps families get through difficult times with less stress and anxiety. Because these aren't just supplies — they're a lifeline that creates the stability children need to heal emotionally and continue learning.

The challenges we help families overcome:

Financial burden

Families who have lost loved ones often have to cut back on essentials. Assistance with food, clothing, and household items eases daily pressures and allows them to focus on what matters most — supporting their children.

Lack of access to basic resources

In many communities, families can't afford essential items like baby formula, diapers, or seasonal clothing.

We provide these necessities to ensure children grow up in dignified conditions.

Emotional well-being

Having warmth, light, and basic comfort at home reduces anxiety, helping children feel stable and regain a sense of normalcy — even if just a little.





The impact of humanitarian aid on children's lives


The Chalovsky family has four children: Mykyta, Iryna, Anna, and Natalia. They used to live in a village in the Kherson region with their parents and grandmother. On the morning of March 12, 2022, around nine o'clock, while their mother and grandmother were working in the yard, tragedy struck — a rocket hit their yard, and both women were killed.

The children and their father miraculously survived. In an instant, they lost not only their beloved family members but also their home, which was almost completely destroyed. Today, the family lives in Vinnytsia region in a house generously provided to them temporarily by kind people. Since their mother was not in the military, the family is not eligible for government benefits.

For the Chalovsky family, the Children of Heroes Fund has been more than just support — it has been a source of warmth, both literally and figuratively. One of the most important gifts they received was a generator, which is essential for rural life in winter.


They also received a washing machine — something the father had been eagerly awaiting, since until then, laundry for all five of them was done by hand. The family was also given financial assistance for clothing and first aid kits with medicine, which proved crucial when the children fell ill that autumn. Support arrives regularly: clothing, shoes, and food. Though they've only recently joined us, they have already become part of the Fund's large family. And every time we speak with them, they say: "There's no one else like you. Thank you all so much!"







HOW THE FUND'S CASE MANAGEMENT SAVED CHILDREN FROM INSTITUTIONAL CARE



Maryna B., mother of children supported by the Children of Heroes Charity Fund

Maryna lives in the village of Mykolo-Babanka in the Kirovohrad region. Until recently, her family — her husband, two daughters, Varvara and Zlata, along with their cats, dogs, chickens, and rabbits — was her whole world. But on January 9, 2023, that world came to a halt. Her husband went missing near Bakhmut.

What followed was a life spent in constant uncertainty — no answers, sleepless nights, and shaken confidence. Marina held on to hope, clinging to every phone call and every mention. But when her husband's comrade returned from captivity with no news of him, Marina seemed to disappear herself. Overwhelmed and exhausted, she stopped eating. Her eldest daughter was the first to notice. Soon after came the ambulance and intensive care.

The day Maryna was taken to the hospital, little Zlata screamed from a corner, "Don't take Mom away!" Varvara held on until the very end but also cried, asking, "Mom, will you come back?"

This turning point marked a new beginning. Psychologists from the Children of Heroes Fund began intensive work with Maryna, supporting her every step of the way. The girls gained stability, conversation, and warmth. And slowly, things began to change.

"I've started living again," Maryna said a few months later. Today, Maryna is a teacher, volunteer, and member of the "Sewing Company." Alongside her daughters, she sews clothes for the wounded. She's also an active participant in the "Families Protecting the Warriors of the 57th Brigade" initiative — attending rallies, speaking out for those still awaited at home, and advocating for everyone's right to return.

The family is gradually healing. The girls spend a lot of time with their animals — they have nine cats, five dogs, a parrot, chickens, and rabbits. This is their vibrant space of love and safety.

Varvara is excelling in her studies — winning competitions, learning English, and dreaming big. Her success isn't just about talent; it's about the supportive environment Maryna created by healing herself and becoming the girls' main source of strength.

Maryna's story is not just about loss — it's a journey from darkness into light. It speaks to an incredible strength of spirit that can rise from rock bottom when it seems there's nothing left to hold onto. It's a story of a new beginning born from support, warmth, and trust. Her experience stands as a powerful testament to how the Fund fights daily for a childhood without orphanhood. And it's a moving example of how timely help can transform the life of an entire family.



MEDICAL INSURANCE

The program helps the **most vulnerable children** affected by the war access quality medical care without placing extra financial strain on their families. It covers outpatient treatment, medication, hospitalization, and emergency care—everything needed to address health issues promptly and prevent them from worsening.

Results for 2024

- 418 children received voluntary health insurance policies as part of the medical insurance program.
- \$69,936 total insurance payouts for medical needs across all active policies.
- \$1,259 the highest amount paid by the insurance company to a beneficiary under a single policy.

During the war, the Fund provides families with first aid kits and vitamins to help them respond quickly to illnesses and take daily care of their health.

In 2024:

- 1,385 families received first aid kits with basic medications.
- **6,340 vitamin packs** were distributed to children and their caregivers.

Doctors' Consultations program

Thanks to partnerships with leading clinics across Ukraine, the children we support can receive free medical examinations, detect health issues early, and access effective treatment.

In 2024, free of charge:

- 544 children received medical consultations.
- 326 children underwent medical tests.
- 350 children completed a full medical check-up.



THE IMPACT OF THE MEDICAL PROGRAM ON POLINA'S LIFE



Polina is six years old. She has a disability and a complex diagnosis: cerebral palsy, hydrocephalus, a brain shunt, and spastic tetraparesis. In her short life, she has already undergone eight surgeries on her head and legs.

She requires ongoing rehabilitation, speech therapy, psychological support, sensory integration, occupational and kinesiology therapy, as well as swimming — all of which help reduce spasticity and improve her motor functions.

Thanks to the support of the Fund and our partners, 260,879 UAH was raised for Polina's medical needs. These funds provided her with vital medications, therapy, and equipment. Specifically, she received special walkers and a bicycle, which have become key to her increased independence.

The Fund's medical program ensures that the children we support—especially those with disabilities or limited access to care—receive quality assistance. The program covers key areas ranging from prevention and dental care to rehabilitation and specialized consultations. Thanks to partnerships with dedicated centers, children undergo physical therapy, neurorehabilitation, and work with psychologists and other specialists. This support helps them recover their health, adapt, and return to active lives.

In 2024, 20 children successfully completed a rehabilitation treatment course at the Ukrainian Medical Center for Mother and Child in Odessa. The rehabilitation program focused on improving the physical and emotional well-being of children requiring specialized medical care.

The rehabilitation program is delivered in-kind through partner rehabilitation centers and specialists who provide services directly, without involving financial transactions. This approach allows us to broaden the range of support and ensure its sustainability. However, rehabilitation is a long-term process. Many children—especially those with disabilities or injury-related complications—require repeated therapy sessions throughout the year. Without consistent, ongoing treatment, meaningful progress isn't possible.

Since free state programs don't cover all the needs, most families have to turn to private centers. This means significant expenses for rehabilitation, accommodation, travel, and support. That's why the Fund continually brings in new partners to ensure help remains continuous and accessible to those who need it most.



THE IMPACT OF THE MEDICAL PROGRAM ON MARK'S LIFE



Mark, a child supported by the Children of Heroes Charity Fund Victoria experienced a difficult twin pregnancy, with premature labor. One of her sons, Bohdanchyk, sadly passed away on his 10th day of life. The other boy, Mark, survived but was diagnosed with cerebral palsy (CP).

Mark is smart, attentive, and curious about the world around him—developmentally, he keeps pace with his peers. But physically, he faces challenges: he can't walk on his own and either moves holding an adult's hand or uses a wheelchair. Mark requires constant care and regular rehabilitation, which is difficult for his family to provide.

In the early days of the full-scale invasion, Mark's father, Oleg, was working near Kyiv. His hometown, Konotop, was occupied by Russian forces. On March 7, 2022, understanding that the war could drag on, he decided to return home. The journey was perilous: destroyed railways, blocked roads, complete uncertainty. Near the village of Mokrets, a group of men—including Oleg—was stopped by Russian soldiers. Although all were unarmed and dressed in civilian clothes, the soldiers threw two grenades at them and then opened fire. Oleg was killed.

After losing her husband, Victoria was left alone with her son. She's learning everything herself—care, rehabilitation, and treatment. Mark not only has cerebral palsy (CP) but also suffers from allergies, astigmatism, and severe nearsightedness. He needs to receive allergy vaccines regularly—Victoria buys them every three months at a cost of 15,000 UAH each.

The Fund supported the family: Mark was able to undergo a rehabilitation course that helps him maintain muscle tone and preserve his skills. But there is still a long road ahead.



THE IMPACT OF THE MEDICAL PROGRAM ON YEHOR'S LIFE

Yehor is 14 years old. He lives with his mother and younger sister Zlata. Their father, a Ukrainian Armed Forces serviceman, was killed on April 14, 2023, during a combat mission in Bakhmut.

Since then, the family has lost their male pillar but stays strong together, fighting every day for stability, dignity, and a normal life despite their loss.

Yehor has a complex diagnosis: cerebral palsy, intellectual disabilities, and symptomatic epilepsy. This means constant pain, limited mobility, and quick fatigue. He requires ongoing rehabilitation—without it, his body weakens rapidly.

Doctors are clear: without proper support, Yehor may lose the ability to walk independently and end up in a wheelchair. But they also say there is hope. Regular therapy can not only maintain his current condition but also improve his quality of life.

Thanks to donor support, Yehor was able to undergo an important rehabilitation course. For him, this is not just treatment—it's a chance to feel movement again, regain hope, and continue developing.

Specialists worked with him comprehensively: physical exercises, individualized therapy, and medication management. Positive progress was evident even after the first course, noticed by both doctors and his mother.

This progress gives the family strength to keep going. They see that with support, Yehor's life can be full, active, and full of possibilities.


"The greatest joy is in the eyes of my children.

My name is Victoria Lisna, and I am one of many mothers whose children have lost their father. Today, I'm not only sharing my own story but also speaking for thousands of families living with pain every day.

Our children are not just statistics. They are living voices filled with anxiety and the effort to stay strong. Some are still too young to understand why their dad isn't coming back. Others already know he's gone forever and try to support their mom or younger siblings.

It was through online communities that I first heard about the Children of Heroes Charity Fund. It became a beacon of hope. For many of us, the Fund has been the support we long sought—not just financial, but emotional, human, and bright.

I've seen a quiet girl who lost her dad smile for the first time because she received a backpack with her favorite cartoon character. I know a boy whom a psychologist helped to finally allow himself to cry. I've heard dozens of stories where families who had nothing received tablets, and their children could learn again.

I know how much summer camps mean to our children, where, perhaps for the first time in a long while, they didn't feel alone. These things don't show up in reports, but they heal the heart.

Families of the fallen often face their pain alone. They don't always have the strength or knowledge of where to turn. For us, it's incredibly important to know: we are not alone. There are those nearby—quietly, steadily, with care. The Children of Heroes Fund is exactly that presence. Not just an organization, but a team of people who every day restore small but vital pieces of childhood to these children.

For this, we—mothers, families, children—are more grateful than words can express.

Psychological Support and Socialization

In 2025, we plan to launch our own psychological support camp program, where children and their caregivers can not only relax but also receive in-depth psychological care. We aim to help every family create their own haven of peace and safety.

Education and Development

Our goal is to create opportunities for children's self-realization and Ukraine's recovery. That's why we're launching a program to prepare motivated teenagers for admission to universities in the USA. The program includes English language learning, subject-specific courses, career guidance, and psychological support.

Family Helpers Program

We are deepening and optimizing personalized family support to ensure every family receives exactly the help they truly need — not just formally, but with genuine care and attention to detail.

Patronage Program

We are launching a new support format — donors can financially sponsor a child. This program enables us to provide consistent support throughout the year to children who have lost one or both parents due to the war.

Psychological Screening

We are developing our own system to assess children's emotional well-being — so we can identify when help is needed early on, and act not only during a crisis but beforehand, when support can still make a difference.

Budget

In 2025, we plan to raise 38% more than last year. Why? Because we see growing needs and expanding impact.
